Public Invited to 9-11 Remembrance Ceremony

The 22 Prince William County residents who lost their lives at the Pentagon and at the World Trade Center on Sept. 11, 2001, will be honored and remembered during a ceremony on Friday, Sept. 9, 2016, at 9 a.m. The public is invited to attend the ceremony, which will be held at the Liberty Memorial. The brief ceremony will culminate with placing a wreath in memory of those who died in the attacks.

The Liberty Memorial, which is located between the Prince William Parkway and James J. McCoart Administration Building, was dedicated on May 9, 2006, to honor those who died on 9/11. The shape of the reflecting pool and walkway recall the 184 lost at the Pentagon. The single stone to the left of that plaque is an original limestone block from the collapsed portion of the Pentagon. The two columns of water represent the 2,749 lost at the World Trade Center in New York City. The stone that encircles the fountain is Pennsylvania flagstone, a tribute to the 40 lives lost in Pennsylvania.

The flag pole standing at the Liberty Memorial is the flag pole that James T. Lynch, Jr., who was killed during the attack on the Pentagon, erected at his home in Prince William County.



The names of those killed from the Prince William area are inscribed on the west wall of the fountain's pool. A sculpture of three pieces of steel from the World Trade Center stands across the street from the Liberty Memorial. The sculpture represents the resilience of the people of the United States even when faced with attacks on the homeland.

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Update on Minnieville Road Project

People who use Minnieville Road between Route 234 and Spriggs Road will be seeing utility workers along the route preparing for the project that will widen Minnieville Road from two to four lanes.

Rich Windish, the Prince William County construction manager overseeing the \$30-million project, said the improvements will ease traffic congestion for drivers with the widening and the new traffic signals and traffic patterns at Route 234. "Because it's going from two lanes to four, it's going to handle a larger volume of traffic. The level of service will be increased by the dual lanes in each direction."

The project, which is part of the voter-approved 2006 Bond Referendum, is scheduled to be complete in November 2018, Windish said. Funding for the project came from the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority, the Virginia Department of Transportation and the county.

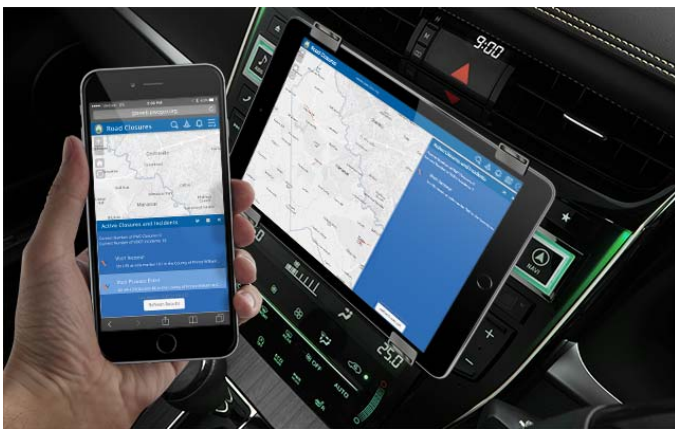
At the same time Minnieville Road is being widened, work will also begin to realign and improve Courage Drive, which parallels Minnieville Road between Howison Park and January Court. This project is the last portion of Minnieville Road to be widened, Windish said.

Windish said the road will remain open during most of the construction, although a detour might be necessary when the project crosses Powell's Creek near Alps Drive. "For the most part, we're setting up a couple of temporary road situations. There may be a point where a detour has to happen when we do the culvert crossing for the bridge, but generally we're going to try to keep the road open as much as possible to full traffic."

Get Road Closure Information in Real Time



Getting information about road closures in Prince William County just got easier. The county's Geographic Information System, or GIS, division worked with the Public Safety Communications Center to create an online application so that people can see road closures in the county in real time. The application shows current incidents, as well as planned road closures.

In addition to the map, the application also includes a feature where the user can sign up to receive notifications about road closures via text or email through the Prince William Community Alert Network, or PWCAN.

Kevin Sadrak, a county GIS developer, said the map updates every 30 seconds with current inputs from the county's fire and rescue and police departments. "It'll take any sort of incident that comes into the system, translate it to the map and send out notification by text or email and show it on the map. Whenever something shows up, the system sees it and fires off the notifications."

It also includes information from VDOT regarding their incidents and planned road closures in the county.

For those who sign up to receive road closure notifications, the new application also gives an all-clear signal when things get back to normal, Sadrak said. "You will actually get a notification that the road has been reopened."

County to Receive Regional Funding for Transportation Projects



*Transportation Action Plan
for Northern Virginia*

After six town hall-style meetings and an extensive public comment period, the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority, or NVTA, has adopted a \$466-million funding program and allocated money for a dozen transportation projects across Northern Virginia, including two road-widening projects in Prince William County.

The first project will widen U.S. 1 between Featherstone Road and Mary's Way from four to six lanes. The NVTA contributed \$11 million to go toward the \$87-million project. Remaining money for the project will come from other state funding sources. According to NVTA briefs, the improvements to U.S. 1 will alleviate bottlenecks and acute traffic congestion and reduce accidents regionally. Locally, the project will make improvements at five intersections to reduce delays between Dumfries and Woodbridge. The project will also include a 10-foot wide multi-use path with pedestrian and bicycle crossing improvements at each of the five intersections. Pedestrian signals will also be installed as part of the project.

The U.S. 1 project has been desperately needed to connect with widening projects to the north and south. This last \$11 million should be enough to get the project fully funded now that design is complete, and we can start to move forward full steam ahead.

The NVTA also contributed \$10 million to help widen Va. 28 between the Va. 234 Bypass and Linton Hall Road, which has a total project cost of \$29 million. The rest of the money for this project will also come from other state funding sources. The Va. 28 project will add one travel lane in each direction that will help improve capacity on the road that currently carries 60,000 vehicles per day and serves Prince William, Loudoun and Fairfax counties, as well as the cities of Manassas and Manassas Park. Shared bicycle and pedestrian paths are included in the project. The Va. 28 project will also include improved traffic signaling at five intersections along the route to ease congestion that can back up a mile or more at some intersections. The 1.5-mile also includes a shared-use trail and sidewalk, according to NVTA documents.

The Va. 28 project is important because it ties into so many other projects in the area. A few years ago, the NVTA cut the ribbon on widening Route 28 from two lanes to four lanes. This will widen it again from four lanes to six lanes, and that's become necessary because of all the other improvements with widening Linton Hall Road, which is now complete. With the widening and realignment of Vint Hill Road and with widening 28 from Vint Hill out to Fitzwater Drive – this will really be the last piece of a system of projects that are really needed to relieve congestion in the Linton Hall area.

A project in Fairfax County to widen Va. 28 between the Prince William County line and U.S. 29 will help local traffic. It isn't in the county, but it's another project that will absolutely benefit Prince William County commuters. It's part of a series of improvements that need to be made to bring a lot of congestion relief to that corridor.

According to an NVTA press release, hundreds of people attended the meetings and commented on candidate projects, viewed project maps, spoke with transportation experts and gave input on projects they would like to see funded. In all, the authority received 346 comments on 24 proposed projects.

The NVTA was created by the General Assembly as a regional body to address transportation and other issues in Northern Virginia. The NVTA manages public funds for transportation projects designed to provide congestion relief throughout the region. Funds for NVTA come from a \$.07-percent regional sales tax.

Update on Purcell Road Project

The Purcell Road Realignment and Safety Improvement project is continuing to progress. The construction activities going on right now are the cutting of the existing slope just before the new retaining wall to grade and the pipe crew are installing the last series of storm waterline. This project involves the improvement and widening of a section of Purcell Road from the intersection with Route 234 to west of the Purcell Branch crossing near Vista Brooke Drive to include the construction of a realigned two-lane road, improvements at the intersection of Purcell Road and Route 234, and improving an existing sharp curve on Purcell Road.

The planned completion date for the Purcell road project as of today will be October 31, 2016, weather permitting.

Prince William Gets Its First Half-Marathon Road Race

Prince William County will host its first major road race on Sunday, Sept. 25, 2016, as the inaugural "Novant Health-UVA Health System Prince William Half-Marathon" begins and ends at Jiffy Lube Live.

The half-marathon is expected to bring in 2,300 to 2,500 runners from at least 25 states, according to event organizer Rob Dulin, president of Fun Run Racing, LLC. A number of participants are also expected to be Prince William County residents, according to Dulin.

"The main thing we really want to promote is the fact that we have an active, vibrant running community here in Prince William County. Now we have a high-profile, distance race in our own backyard, which gives us the opportunity to showcase Prince William County."

Participants will run along University Boulevard to U.S. Route 29 North where they will turn around just before the intersection of Sudley Road. There are three additional loops off of Route 29, where runners will follow the course around New York Monuments Loop, the parking lot at Deep Cut, and the loop around Brawner Farm.

Therefore, residents and travelers should take note that Route 29, between University Boulevard and Sudley Road, will be closed that day from 6 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. Spectators for the event will not be able to access the course, but there will be a number of activities at Jiffy Lube Live throughout the duration of the event according to Dulin. "We will have a Runner's Village with live bands and festivities beginning at 6:30 a.m., and spectators will be able to cheer on the runners at the start of the race, enjoy live music and entertainment, and then cheer the runners in as they make their way back to the finish line."

Left-Turn Entrance to Staples Mills Shopping Center re-opened!



Those who live near or shop at the Staple Mill Shopping Center (with the Food Lion and Armetta's Restaurant) at the corner of Minnieville and Spriggs Roads will likely know that the "back entrance" to the shopping center that allow left turns to and from Spriggs Road was constructed many years ago when the County widened the road, but was then subsequently closed with concrete barriers. The closure was due to the lack of an easement agreement between the shopping center owners and the owner of the adjacent property. So for several years, drivers have had to make, often dangerous, U-Turns to access the center from Spriggs Road, or use the entrance at Minnieville Road which is often difficult to access.

Finally, this month, the County was able to work out the final details between all of the property owners and the proper easements were granted, so from now on, the back entrance will be open and coming into and out of this popular shopping center will be much safer. Once users of the center have adjusted to the new traffic patterns, the temporary right turn exit onto Spriggs Road will be closed.

Thank you to all of the residents who helped me keep pressure on the commercial property owners to resolve this issue, and thank you all for your patience!

County Hires New Transportation Director



Following a nationwide search and competitive hiring process, the Board of County Supervisors announced Ricardo Canizales as the new Transportation Director for Prince William County.

Canizales has worked for Prince William County's Department of Transportation for 14 years. His most recent role with the department was as Transportation Planning Division Chief, where he was responsible for the management and operation of the Transportation Planning and Programming Division. Before working for the county, Canizales was employed by the Virginia Department of Transportation and the Richmond Regional Planning District Commission.

"Prince William County has one of the most successful road building programs in the Commonwealth," said Corey A. Stewart, Chairman of the Prince William Board of County Supervisors. "Rick Canizales' experience with planning, programming and funding transportation projects along with his relationships with regional, state and federal partners will be essential as we continue to improve the transportation and commuting options for the residents of Prince William County."

Two New Schools Open in Coles District

We are so pleased about the two new schools opening this year to students in the Coles District, Charles J. Colgan, Sr. High School and Kyle R. Wilson Elementary School.

Charles J. Colgan, Sr. High school is named in honor of Virginia's longest serving state senator, a revered statesman, aviation entrepreneur and champion of economic development, and a passionate advocate for education. The school has a 2,200 student capacity along with 13 science lab rooms specialized by subject area and 9 specialized rooms with technology emphasis. In addition there is a conservation area for use with environmental science. There is also a PWCS Aquatics Center with 25-meter stretch and dive pool and separate leisure pool, with complete spectator seating and locker facility, plus a football, baseball, and softball stadium. Colgan High School is located at 13833 Dumfries Road, Manassas, VA 20112.

Kyle Robert Wilson, who became a firefighter to save the lives of others, died on Monday, April 16, 2007, while battling a house fire in Woodbridge. He was 24 years old. Kyle was born in Olney, Maryland, on May 25, 1982, and grew up in Prince William County. He graduated from C.D. Hylton High School in 2000 and graduated from George Mason University in 2005 with a degree in athletic training. He joined the Prince William County Department of Fire and Rescue in January 2006, graduating from the Academy on June 23, 2006. He will always remain a hero.

Kyle R. Wilson Elementary School has an 850 student capacity, 1 Physical Education/Softball Field, 2 concrete and 2 mulched Play Areas, a computer lab, plus art, music, and band rooms. The elementary school is located at 5710 Liberty Hill Court, Woodbridge, VA 22193.

County Wins Achievement Award for Vacancy Impact Report

The Virginia Association of Counties recently announced the recipients of its 2016 Achievement Awards, and Prince William County was among the winners. Winning nominations focused on programs that impacted their community and enhanced the lives of residents; and they were selected for their innovation and practices that could be used as a model for other local governments.

In Fiscal Year 2016, the Prince William County Office of Executive Management formed a cross-agency team — comprised of staff from Human Resources, the Office of Budget and Management, and the Department of Information Technology — to create a Vacancy Impact Report that would enhance transparency for the Board of County Supervisors and county residents to better understand the organization and clearly demonstrate the impact vacancies have on the organization.

The report identified relevant information about each position in the organization that was vacant at the time of publication, and included such information as which department housed the position, funding sources and whether the activity the position performs is mandated. The information was provided for the Board of County Supervisor's to use during their budget deliberations.

Prior to the implementation of the Vacancy Impact Report, an internal vacancy report was manually compiled during the budget process and required extensive input from staff. The new Vacancy Impact Report has been automated and provides context around a given vacancy that can be used to determine the position's true impact in terms of service delivery. The real-time reporting saves hundreds of hours of staff time by eliminating the need to gather, track, edit and verify information manually during the budget process.
